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Kokomo Area Career Center

Overview

The Kokomo Area Career Center provides hands-on, project-based career and technical education for more than 1,250 students in grades 9-12 enrolled at Kokomo, Eastern, Northwestern, Western, Taylor, Tri-Central, and Maconaquah high schools; as well as eighth-grade students enrolled in the Career schools at Bon Air and Maple Crest. Approximately 242 college credits are available for KACC students, in addition to job shadows, internships, and clinical rotations as part of the student preparation for employment and/or post-secondary education. The Kokomo Area Career Center, in partnership with Kokomo High School, is authorized to offer the International Baccalaureate Career-related Program.



Veterinary Careers

ABOUT: The Veterinary Careers class provides a hands-on experience for students interested in working in the Veterinary field upon graduation from high school or college. Students study animal care and husbandry, nail trims, ear cleanings, restraints for different procedures, and dog and cat behavior. Students learn anatomy and physiology of several different domestic animals, as well as some large animals, such as horses. Strong emphasis is placed on medical terminology. Students also participate in job shadowing experiences at local Veterinary facilities. Students have opportunities to experience field trips to the Indianapolis Zoo, Purdue University Veterinary School, and an Equine facility. Upon completion of the Veterinary Careers class students are prepared to enter the workforce at the entry level, or to continue their education at several post-secondary schools.

PATHWAY BRAGS: Most students who apply are accepted into a Veterinary Technology program, including Purdue University and Vet Tech Institute of Indianapolis.



ALUMNI BRAGS: Many alumni currently are practicing as Registered Veterinary Technicians in several specialties, including Emergency & Critical Care, Intensive Care Units, General Small Animal Veterinary Clinics, and at Equine facilities.

Welding

ABOUT: Students learn the different welding processes, including MIG, TIG and stick welding, as well as how to create a blueprint of their weld. KACC students will learn how metals differ and how to weld a variety of materials. Once skilled in the welding processes, students then learn how to fabricate, which involves design, problem-solving, and execution of the project. Students also learn how to use the powder-coating equipment available.



PATHWAY BRAGS: Students leave the welding program with the skills needed to go straight into employment. Many students choose to further their education with specialized welding training. Instructors often have employers contact the Kokomo Area Career Center asking for students, who are interested in employment.

CERTIFICATION: *AWS 3G Vertical Up*

ALUMNI BRAGS: Kokomo Area Career Center educated welding students who are employed in various positions throughout the United States. Some former KACC students have worked on oil platforms, in the space industry, and in fabrication shops. Several KACC students have started their own design and fabrication businesses.

Agriculture

ABOUT: Students learn real-world skills and discuss trends that affect the ever-changing world of agriculture. Some practical skills include welding, construction, plumbing and electrical. KACC students have the unique opportunity to use their knowledge and practice their skills at a farm plot at Elwood Haynes Elementary School. The agriculture students are responsible for preparing the soil, starting plants in a greenhouse, transplanting their plants, tending to the plot throughout the summer, then harvesting and distributing the produce in the fall.

ALUMNI BRAG: Student attending Central Georgia Technical University for agriculture and welding.

Dental Health Careers

ABOUT: Students learn about the careers available within the field of dentistry. Labs and experiences expose students to skills associated with either being a dentist, dental hygienist, dental assistant, or dental laboratory technician. Students build a foundation of dental terminology, head and neck anatomy, dental skills, infection control, and professionalism. Students who continue into the second year program learn additional career-related skills and participate in an internship that reflects their career goals.


ALUMNI BRAGS: Several graduates are working in Kokomo dental facilities and throughout the state of Indiana. We have graduates also teaching for the Ivy Tech Dental Assisting program and the IU School of Dentistry Hygiene Program.

C.N.A

(Certified Nursing Assistant)

ABOUT: Students begin their education with a combination of classroom and lab time where they learn seventy-two (72) resident care procedures. Kokomo Area Career Center has a simulated long-term care facility where students are able to learn and practice these skills. Upon completion of this segment, students then complete 75 clinical hours at a local long-term care facility where they collaborate with nurses and C.N.A.'s learning the day-to-day operations and procedures. Successful completion of this course allows students to sit for the Indiana State Department of Health exam to become a Certified Nursing Assistant.

Medical Assisting

ABOUT: Students will prepare for the National Healthcare Association Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA) Exam. Instruction includes taking and recording vital signs, preparing patients for examination, patient education and assisting the physician during this exam. The collection and preparation of laboratory specimens and basic laboratory tests will be covered. Students will learn preparations for the administration of medication, venipuncture, ECG and wound care. This class provides a basic understanding of the clinical and administrative duties pertinent to medical offices; as well as the responsibilities, including medical correspondence and records, case histories of patients, filing, appointment scheduling and receptionist duties. Students also participate in an internship/job shadow experience during their second semester.

CERTIFICATION: *Certified Clinical Medical Assistant (CCMA)*

Exercise Science

ABOUT: Exercise Science students learn how to identify different types of injuries to the body, the anatomy of each joint of the body, how to build rehabilitation programs for each joint of the body and body mechanics. The exercise science program is designed for students who are interested in pursuing a career in Physical Therapy, Athletic Training or Occupational Therapy.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Most students who complete our Exercise Science program are accepted into a college program.

Biomedical (Project Lead the Way)

ABOUT: The Biomedical pathway is designed for students who want a laboratory hands-on exposure to the health careers field. Students have the opportunity to study cancer cells and DNA, learn how to use micropipettes, microscopes, incubators, digital scales, and hot plates. Biomedical students are introduced to anatomy, physiology, microbiology, and molecular biology, while they also dissect sheep hearts, cow eyes, and pig kidneys.

CO/PREREQUISITE: Biology I

ALUMNI BRAGS: Many Biomedical students have gone on to college and earned their Registered Nurse (RN) license. One former KACC student currently is attending the IU School of Medicine.

Construction Trades



ABOUT: Construction Trades students gain skills needed to construct a home- from the ground to the roof. Students work with concrete, framing, installing electrical outlets and switches, installing plumbing, making rafters, sheeting and roofing. Students also have the opportunity to do work with masonry, welding and woodworking.

CERTIFICATIONS: *NCCER Core Certifications*

HVAC (Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning)

ABOUT: Students learn theory and application of HVAC systems. Students then progress to the practical application of the skill sets and prove proficiency through the application of hands-on task analysis. Students will have the opportunity to visit job sites and perform services in a real-world application. Upon successful completion of the HVAC pathway, students have the opportunity to earn a certificate in HVAC/R Technology from Ivy Tech Community College. With this credential students can earn 7 nationally-recognized certifications, including OSHA 10 Safety and the EPA 608 certification.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Graduates have multiple options, including a Union apprenticeship program, post-secondary education and/or directly entering the HVAC workforce.

Electrical

ABOUT: Students learn theory and application of Electrical systems. Students then progress to the practical application of the skill sets and prove proficiency through the application of hands-on task analysis. Students have the opportunity to visit job sites and perform services in a real-world application. Upon successful completion of the Electrical pathway, students will earn NCCER certifications in 6 areas of electrical proficiency, OSHA 10 Safety and a Technical Certificate from Ivy Tech Community College.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Graduates have multiple options including the Union apprenticeship program, post-secondary education and/or directly entering the Electrical workforce.

Cosmetology

ABOUT: Students learn skills and techniques related to the art of hairdressing, such as hair cutting, coloring, perming, and chemical relaxing, aesthetics such as facials and waxing; and manicuring and pedicuring. Students have the opportunity to compete in SkillsUSA and attend America's Beauty Show in Chicago, IL. This program requires 1,500 hours of classroom time to complete; therefore, the class is from 11:45 AM – 4:45 PM each school day with a 2:20 PM release on Fridays. Upon completion of the two-year program students will be eligible to sit for their Indiana State Cosmetology License.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Graduates of the KACC Cosmetology School are employed at local salons, such as Posh, Solutions, Great Clips, Barlow's Barbershop and Fade. Several graduates manage their own salons.

Culinary Arts

ABOUT: Students learn culinary, management and problem-solving skills through hands-on, real-life experiences. Students provide catering services to the public and practice using commercial equipment and large quantity production. Students can choose to participate in Culinary, Baking, and Management competitions where students can show off their skills and passions for the opportunity to win scholarships. Students also compete in a Cook Around the World competition at Disney World where students are judged by celebrity chefs and have an additional opportunity for scholarships.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Culinary students have placed in the top three at state competitions. After earning the ServSafe certification, students have been promoted by their employer - including to Manager.

Human And Social Services

ABOUT: Students in this pathway learn the basic skill set required in Human and Social Services. KACC students are introduced to the Code of Ethics, mental health diagnosis, treatment options, and the skills required of an entry level Human Services Worker. Students will learn to identify the effects of culture, trauma, and socioeconomic status on clients. Students will understand how clients react differently to situations because of their culture. During the second year of the program, students job shadow in an agency so they can apply the skills learned in real-life situations.



Radio & Television Production

ABOUT: Students learn how to produce programming for radio, television, and digital audiences. Many opportunities are available to create productions in a variety of formats. While all students learn to use audio and video equipment, many projects are customized to fit student interests and future pursuits. While not required, journalism and creative writing are classes that would be helpful for a radio and TV student.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Our Radio and TV alumni can be found in the television industry as a news anchor, a broadcast producer, a video editor, and an actor. KACC alumni also are in radio as morning show hosts while several own their own video companies. Those KACC students not entering this career field have benefited from enhanced skills in communications, troubleshooting, and teamwork.

Digital Design

ABOUT: Students learn the Adobe software programs, Photoshop and Illustrator, and then students practice these skills by creating logos, illustrations for items, such as book jackets, magazine covers, business cards, signs, and t-shirts. Students learn the operation of cameras and how to edit photos. Students also can learn how to manage social media for a business.

STEM Design And Engineering

(Project Lead the Way)


ENGINEERING: Students in the Engineering pathway learn basic concepts from force calculations to electrical circuit calculations to programming software to CAD design which all fields of engineering use during the course of their everyday jobs. Students also have the opportunity to experience 3D printing and laser engraving.

DESIGN TECHNOLOGY: Students learn AutoCAD software and become skilled in creating blueprint drawings. Architecture students design homes, and become familiar with how to dimension blueprints (show measurements) with basic building requirements. Mechanical students design objects and learn how to create drawings that show different views of their project. Students also have the opportunity to experience laser engraving.

PATHWAY BRAGS: Several Architectural design students have earned direct admit to the Ball State School of Architecture as incoming freshmen. This direct admit is due to the portfolio created during their two-year KACC pathway.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Many students have earned Engineering degrees, a KACC student is currently a Lead Engineer for Delta Faucet.

Cyber Security


ABOUT: Students will learn basic programming and algorithms, while understanding how to build, install and maintain devices and software as well as basic networking and security. Students also will prepare for the CompTIA A+ Certification Exam. During the second year of the pathway, which will be experienced on the Ivy Tech-Kokomo campus, students will learn to set up and troubleshoot routers and switches for a small network, as well as understanding the technologies and techniques used in creating a secure network.

Criminal Justice

ABOUT: Students study the three main areas of the Criminal Justice system; policing, courts, and corrections. Kokomo Area Career Center students learn how these systems function separately and how they work together to make up our criminal justice system. Career exploration in all fields also is a key component of the curriculum. Students participate in activities, such as fingerprinting, mock trials, mock arrests, mock pullover; and analyze criminal behavior. Students are exposed to forensics, criminology and culture awareness, as well as visiting facilities such as the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy, Vohne Liche Kennels, Kinsey Juvenile Facility, Howard County Circuit Court, the IUK Crime Lab, a 911 Dispatch Location, a County Jail tour, and ride in a SWAT vehicle. Many guest speakers, including; Military representatives, Kokomo Police Officer, State Police Officer, Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) Officer, Probation officer, Juvenile Prosecutor, Coroner, Detective, Correctional Officer, Bomb Squad representative, Public Defender, Victim’s Advocate, Drug and Alcohol Counselor, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) officer, Entomologist, Department of Natural Resources (DNR) officer and a paralegal, share their experiences with our KACC students.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Former KACC Criminal Justice students are employed with the Howard County Jail, the Howard County Sheriff’s Department, the Kinsey Youth Facility, and as a counselor at the Miami County Correctional Facility.

Business/Marketing

ABOUT: The Business Marketing program progresses through an introductory business class to marketing fundamentals; and then to more targeted and strategic marketing. Both virtual and real-world scenarios are used to illustrate the concepts students learn.

Entrepreneurship

ABOUT: Entrepreneurship students at the Kokomo Area Career Center are responsible for real businesses and understand the real-time application of what they are learning in class. The students operate a vending machine, screen printing, embroidery, and a large format printing business. Students are responsible for marketing, customer acquisition, new product development, sourcing materials, production, and accounting. Because students are responsible for working with clients and resolving problems (with instructor support and supervision) they improve communication, creative thinking, and problem-solving skills.


Kokomo CEO

(Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities)

ABOUT: The Kokomo CEO (Creating Entrepreneurial Opportunities) program is much more than a textbook course. Students are immersed in real-life learning experiences with the opportunity to take risks, manage the results, and learn from the outcomes. Students visit a wide variety of businesses throughout the Kokomo area and learn from the owners what it means to start and maintain a successful business. Students learn about the failures and successes along the way. Students conduct a business in class - historically the CEO Summit - and create a business. Their individual businesses are showcased at the CEO Trade Show.

Automotive Service



ABOUT: Automotive Service students learn the correct way to perform basic maintenance and do light repair on modern vehicles. KACC students learn how to properly diagnose and repair electrical and electronic systems, antilock brake systems, and traction control systems. Students also can earn several industry certifications.

ALUMNI BRAGS: Several of our graduates went directly into the workforce and earned promotions to shop foreman, service manager, and even the general manager. KACC auto service graduates work on pit crews for NASCAR and NHRA teams.



Automotive Collision Repair

ABOUT: Collision Repair students learn technical skills, such as dent removal, application of plastic filler to repair dents, and the process of priming a vehicle for final paint. Students also learn custom painting and how to use an airbrush for more detailed designs. In May of each year the Collision Repair and Automotive Service classes host a car show at the Kokomo Area Career Center. Collision Repair students build and custom paint the trophies that are awarded to participants.
